

The Kenya Red Cross estimated about 2.7 million people were in need of food aid after low rainfall in October and November, with the next Kenya rainy season not due before April. Kenyan President Uhuru Kenyatta called for "local and international partners to come in and support the government's efforts to contain the Out of Kenya's 47 counties, 23 have been deemed to be facing disastrous drought.
